Take-Home Assignment: Understanding Leviticus 18

Dear Elementary Students and Families,

This week, we learned about Leviticus 18, which is a part of the Bible that talks about the rules God gave to the Israelites. These rules were meant to help them live in a way that respects themselves and others.

Activity: Discuss and Reflect

1. Read Together:

Spend some time reading Leviticus 18 with your family. If you can, find a children's version of the Bible or a storybook that explains these verses in simpler language. Discuss why rules are important in our lives.

2. Family Discussion:

- Talk about a rule you have at home and why it's important.
- How do you feel when everyone follows the rule? What happens if the rule is broken?
- Compare this to the rules God gave Moses. Why do you think God gave these rules?

Creative Activity: Make a Rule Poster

1. Purpose:

Create a colorful poster that shows some important rules or values for your family that help everyone feel safe and respected.

2. Steps:

- Take a large piece of paper or poster board.
- Write down 3-5 rules that are important in your home.
- Decorate the poster with drawings or stickers that show why these rules are important.
- Display the poster in a place where everyone can see it, like the kitchen or living room.

Reflection Questions:

1. How do rules help us live together peacefully and kindly?
2. Think of one rule that is difficult for you to follow. Why is it hard, and what can you do to improve?
3. How can following rules show love and respect to others?

Optional Extension: Family Values Journal

- Take a small notebook and label it "Family Values Journal."
- Throughout the week, write or draw about one of the rules or values from your poster. Describe a time when someone in your family followed this rule, and how it made your family stronger or happier.

Thank you for exploring Leviticus 18 with your family. We hope this activity helps you understand the importance of living respectfully and thoughtfully with all those around you.
