Background Notes for Leviticus 21

Historical Context:

- Leviticus is the third book of the Bible, part of the Old Testament.

- Use examples to illustrate how rules help guide us in good behavior today, similar to how these laws guided the Israelites.
- Encourage students to think about ways they can show respect for God in their everyday actions.
