Activity 1: Role-Playing "Listening and Obeying"

Instructions:

1. Break the class into groups of 4-5.
2. Assign each group a short passage from Deuteronomy 4:1-14 to read aloud.
3. Ask students to create a simple skit that demonstrates the importance of listening and obeying rules, as highlighted in the passage.

Roles:

- Reader: Reads the passage aloud to the group.
- Director: Guides the group in creating the skit.
- Actors: Perform the skit.
- Timekeeper: Ensures the activity finishes on time.

Discussion Prompts:

- Why is it important to listen to and obey these rules?

- Facilitator: Leads the discussion circle.
- Reader: Reads the passage aloud.
- Recorder: Writes down key points from the discussion.

Discussion Prompts:

- What are some important rules or lessons you have learned?
- How can you be sure to remember them?
- Why is sharing these lessons with others important?

Participation:

Students take turns speaking, ensuring everyone has the chance to express their thoughts.

Activity 3: Creative Drawing "Symbolic Reminders"

Instructions:

1. Provide paper and drawing materials to each group of 3-4 students.
2. Read Deuteronomy 4:15-31 aloud to the class.
3. Ask each group to draw a picture that represents key teachings or reminders from the passage.

Roles:

- Presenter: Shares the group's drawing with the class.
- Artists: Work on creating the drawing.
- Encourager: Supports and encourages team members.

Discussion Prompts:

- What main idea does your drawing represent?
- How does your drawing help us remember these teachings?
- What symbols did you use and why?

Participation:

Every student contributes to the drawing, ensuring all have input in the creative process.
