1 Samuel 22 Background Notes for Elementary Students and Teachers

Historical Context:

1. Time Period: The events of 1 Samuel take place during the time of the early kings of Israel, around 1000 BCE.

2. Leadership and Loyalty: David's gathering of followers demonstrates themes of leadership, trust, and loyalty. Although he was not yet king, people saw his potential and believed in his leadership.
3. Consequences of Actions: King Saul's actions against the priests at Nob highlight the importance of integrity and the serious consequences of making unjust decisions.

2. Friendship and Community: Discuss the importance of supporting one another and how David and his followers helped each other.
